British Home Children

Between 1869 and 1932, over 100,000 children were sent from Britain to Canada through assisted juvenile emigration. These migrants are called **"Home Children"** because most of them travelled from a British emigration agency's Home for Children to receiving homes in Canada. From there, the children were placed with families in rural Canada. Library and Archives Canada at Wikitree works to add to the stories of these children by providing spaces to tell the story of each child. We will look at one case study and show you the how and why of adding this information to WikiTree.

United Empire Loyalists

The United Empire Loyalists were generally those who had been settled in the thirteen colonies at the outbreak of the American Revolution, who remained loyal to, and took up the Royal Standard, and who settled in what is now Canada at the end of the war. At WikiTree, we work on connecting all loyalists to a global family tree by creating and improving profiles for loyalists and their families. We will walk through the work being done at WikiTree for these loyalists.




In 2022, we started travelling through BC, featuring books from different areas, starting with the Lower Mainland and now returning back to the Vancouver area.





JANUARY 2023 MEMBER ARTICLE

I started family history research years ago. So much time has passed that things have changed almost beyond recognition in the world of research. Sometimes, I feel like I'm struggling to keep up. It reminds me of a time when I was visiting an English county my ancestors had lived in.

I was on a train from London to Dorchester, calmly listening to the announcements over the loudspeaker. A disembodied voice stated that only the front of the train would be continuing on. Wait a minute, I was in the back of the train! I grabbed my suitcase from the luggage rack, pelted down the stairs and started running. Never had a train platform seemed so long!

Talk about struggling to keep up. I barely made it into my new seat before the front of the train pulled away. Train timetables probably allow time for bumbling tourists like me to catch on to the English way of running railways. At times I feel the same way when new technology shows up for genealogists.

I travelled the rails a lot on that 2006 trip to England. I took in Northamptonshire, Dorset and, of course, London; all places that figure in my family's history. It's my Dorset research that I plan to revisit now.

My renewed interest in that county is because of a **DNA match**. One where the person who tested emailed me! We think we've narrowed down the location to Dorset, although for a while it looked like it might have been London. Dorset seems more doable. With no surnames in common, it's time to insert collateral lines into my family tree, for that county at least.

It's strange to think that autosomal DNA might take my Dorset research further back. When I visited Dorset in person, autosomal DNA tests weren't even a thing. As I remember, most genealogical collaboration was done by email and RootsWeb lists. Will new technology be the catalyst to bring more clarity to the lives of my many ancestors who lived in that part of the south of Britain?

I'll have to start working on my collateral ancestors to see what turns up. But something that interests me, now that I look back, was the ambitious trip that I took. What was I thinking, haring off on my own? My plans seem to have been well thought out, but it's the date that trips me up. 2006 was just over two years after my spouse had come near to dying. He was still dealing with the effects of his life-altering injuries, as were we all.

Sometimes revisiting research reminds me of what I went through, and the genealogical quest that egged me on. Family history can be frustrating, but it can also give back so much more. It's the stories that fascinate me the most, not only those of my ancestors, but piecing together my research trips brings back pieces of my own story. Maybe trying to understand myself can bring me closer to understanding those who went before.

ABOUT YOUR RESEARCH-

How old were you when you started/became interested in family history? I was 15. On a family vacation to see Expo67 and distant relatives in Ontario we found ourselves in a rural church cemetery, gazing at a tall gravestone with our surname SHARON on it. My father piqued my curiosity, telling me that he had a book back home about our ancestors which I then used to draw up a family tree. Ten years later I found my teenage notes and headed to the library to find books on how to further trace my family tree. At the library, I learned that

there were groups of people like me, called genealogists! I joined the Alberta GS, Ontario GS, and, a few years later when I returned to BC, the BCGS.

ABOUT YOUR RELATIONSHIP WITH THE BCGS-

When did you join the BCGS? About 40 years ago. At one point there was an opportunity to purchase a lifetime membership so I did. It's been great to stay connected to the BCGS, no matter where I've lived. I've just returned to the Lower Mainland this fall after 25 years in the Interior. Most recently, I've been Editor of *Kamloops Family History Society's* journal **"Family Footsteps"**. (Kamloops FHS is an affiliate society of BCGS.)



Cloverdale's History

The Cloverdale area was first settled around 1870 and among the first settlers were the three Shannon brothers. In 1875, William and Thomas Shannon purchased 960 acres of land from the government. William Shannon (1843–1928) was inspired to name the area "Clover Valley" after the scent of the summer clover that bloomed in the valley in this rich agricultural region. Developed along the railway tracks, the business area grew to become an important railway and commercial hub.

Clover Valley was the City of Surrey's first town centre, officially established in 1879 near Five Corners, the historic intersection of 60 Avenue and Old McClellan Road. Adding railways was significant to developing the area. Linking Bellingham, Washington to New Westminster was the subsidiary of the Great Northern Railway forged in the valley in 1891. It also profited from the arrival of the BC Electric Railway Line that ran out to Chilliwack from 1910 to 1950.

Clover Valley became the site of Surrey's Town Hall in the early 1880s. The community drifted 2km away to the West, to the New Westminster Southern Railway line and became known as Cloverdale. In 1912 the Municipal Hall was built in the southwest corner of Cloverdale (176A Street and 56th Avenue) and served as this until 1962.

Cloverdale being the historic centre of Surrey, is home to one of Surrey's most recognizable main streets as well as the Museum of Surrey, Surrey Archives, BC Vintage Truck Museum, Fraser Valley Heritage Railway and many unique heritage buildings including Christ Church which was built in 1882. Also built in 1882 was Surrey's first school which was established on land donated by Joseph Shannon. It was located in the area of 176th Street and 60th Avenue.

It is also home to the **Cloverdale Public Library** where many a genealogist has visited, researched and attended workshops at.



In the 1920s and 1930s, Cloverdale was a common destination for Americans in Washington State seeking alcohol to address the Prohibition laws.

In 1968, Cloverdale's population was 5,000 and in 2021 was estimated to be approximately 76,000.

The community has been home to filming, including one of Coca-Cola's Christmas commercials (filmed during the summer, town centre square was decked with Christmas decorations including fake snow), the television shows Smallville and Supernatural (filmed at Christ Church on Old McLellan Road), Deck The Halls, Postal, Hot Rod TV Shows. In addition to being filmed there, the town of Cloverdale was a fictional setting of the Stargate Universe episode "Cloverdale".

Every year, Cloverdale is home to the largest Canada Day family celebration in Western Canada, offering free music, activities and food. Since 1945, and except for a few years absence including 2022, Cloverdale has hosted the annual Cloverdale Rodeo.



Meet Libby, Your New Genealogy Best Friend





She's much friendlier than her stodgy predecessor, OverDrive, and she's way more versatile too. Check out this short introductory video to see how to interact with Libby. libbyapp.com

Once you've downloaded Libby to your preferred device and started her up (or you can go her website), she'll help you enter your TNRL library card number. This webpage from the TNRL has links to all the things you can do with Libby's help:

- find, borrow, renew and return library items
- read c-books





- listen to c-audiobooks
- create and manage holds for items you'd like to borrow that aren't currently available
- · download items for reading when you're not connected to the Internet

And, like a good friend, you can ask Libby to let you know when something comes up that requires your attention, such as notifying you when a new issue of any of your favourite magazines is available. Libby does this and more using her tags feature.

RESPONSE TO: DO YOU BAKE FOR CHRISTMAS? (DECEMBER ISSUE)

Marjorie Barlow Hall was my mother. She was a really good cook, but unfortunately, she died before I was really into learning the recipes she made. I have a feeling that many of them were not even measured, just done by look and feel. After she died, my father and I searched for her recipe book, as I wanted to make some scones. We never found the book, but years later after my father also passed away in 1994, I inherited a lot of papers, amongst which was a small book, originally intended for autographs, in which my mother had written her name and address, and some of her favorite recipes. She often made scones and I remember her entering them into the Women's Institute Fair and winning first prize for them!

After trying out the recipe, I discovered that the instructions were far from complete, so here is what I think she intended to say:

THE INGREDIENTS:

- ½ lb flour (1 ¾ cups)
- ¼ tsp salt
- Bare 3 ozs sugar (just under ½ cup)
- 2 ozs butter (¼ cup)
- 1 egg
- 2 ozs sultanas (½ cup) nowadays you could add cranberries or other fruits for Christmas
- 1 tsp Baking Powder

METHOD:

- Place flour in a bowl and add the salt.
- Add butter and rub as fine as breadcrumbs, I use a pastry tool as I have hot hands.
- Add the sugar, sultanas and baking powder.
- Beat the egg and add to dry ingredients, using as much milk as necessary to make a stiff dough.
- Place on countertop and form or roll out to about ¾ inch thick.
- Use a pastry cutter dipped in flour so that it doesn't stick.
- Brush egg and milk on the top if you wish them to brown.
- Place on a lined cookie sheet and bake near the top of the oven, for 15 minutes at 375°F.
- Serve with jam and Devonshire Clotted Cream for a treat.
- (Save on Foods in Richmond stocks clotted cream!)
