

MESSAGE FROM THE BCGS eJOURNAL EDITOR




BCGS GENBLASTS



The Story Behind a Picture Postcard - July 2020 Janice Kidwell, BCGS member #5033

ST. PAUL'S CHURCH SALT SPRING ISLAND, BC

St. Paul's was founded in 1878 by Father Gustave Donckele, the first Catholic priest to the Gulf Island. Before the church was built, he used to row to Salt Spring from the mission at Cowichan to say mass in parishioners' homes. Under his direction, St. Paul's Church was built between 1880 and 1885 on land donated by Horace John Shepherd, a non-Catholic. The Hawaiian Catholic community did the majority of the construction along with assistance from the Cowichan people and a number of Fulford Valley residents. The original doors, bell and windows were brought over from the Butter Church in Cowichan Bay by First Nations, first by dugout canoe to Burgoyne



Bay and then by an ox-drawn stone-boat through the valley. St. Paul's was consecrated by Bishop J. B. Brondel on May 10 in 1885. St. Paul's is the first landmark one sees as the ferry nears Fulford Harbour.



Ann tells us that despite the Covid-19 restrictions, the BCGS Research Team can still search the Clippings Index, Cemetery Recordings, Vancouver Sun Newspapers - 1999 to 2012 obituaries, and various other databases which BCGS has digitally produced.

If you are a member of the BCGS, email Ann with your queries at queryrequest@bcgs.ca. Our BC Research volunteers will be happy to assist you in any way they can and there is no charge for this service. If your request is complicated and time consuming, BC Research may ask you for a small donation. A non-member is charged specific fees based on what they are asking.

The BCGS Genealogical Library has nearly 18,000 books, over 12,000 newspaper clippings, and many film, CD, and computerized databases. The library catalogue is available online at https://20575.rmwebopac.com/ to help you prepare for your next visit to the library.



An interesting feature is the rotating group of books at the bottom of the screen; titles are recent additions to our collection. The catalogue team is still working on adding front cover photos for books in the library.

Researchers often prepare a list of books and material before visiting a library or archive. Another feature of the new catalogue is the book bin. You can search for books for your topics and if you think a book might be of interest, can add it to your bin. Then you can print out the list of 'bin' books for your next research session at the library. Note: The book bin only stays as long as you are on the web page so remember to print your list before moving on to other areas of the website.

The BCGS Genealogical Library is still closed due to Covid-19. We look forward to the day when we reopen for researchers.



Scotland Coffee Chat Follow-up The first Scotland Chat via Zoom (above) was held on June 16th and was facilitated by Eunice Robinson, Researchers were happy to be able to get together virtually, and share successes about recent research and ask for help on how they could further their research. It was a comfortable atmosphere appreciated by all who took part. More to come.





England Coffee Chat Follow-up - Saturday, June 20th - Rob Whitlock We had 15-16 people participate via Zoom, with a couple of people from outside the Lower Mainland who otherwise would not be attending

because of distance, ferry rides, etc. BCGS may want to continue to carry-on with some virtual sessions just for this reason, once COVID-19 is 'sorted'. Will there ever be 'a normal' again...

The group participated in an active round table, talking about their individual research work and sharing some common websites that not everyone was aware of. Rob Whitlock reminded the group that the **UK National Archives (TNA)** https://www.nationalarchives.gov.uk/ was still allowing for free downloads of a range of documents.

Rob also talked about **Deceased Online** https://www.deceasedonline.com/, a newer site which includes details of graves mainly in the UK (such as actual cemetery registers showing burials in an

individual plot). He also recommended **FreeReg** https://www.freereg.org.uk/, a companion site to FreeBMD https://www.freebmd.org.uk/. This site has grown progressively to include many parish records and often is not limited to just Church of England records.

Finally, Rob mentioned the International Society for British Genealogy and Family History https://www.isbgfh.com/, which normally hosts a week-long event in Salt Lake City. The event will be virtual this year and run from October 12 - 14. It includes sessions on England, Wales and Irish records. Details of the sessions are a bit confusing, as they are being advertised as a precursor to next year's event, which they hope will take place "as per normal". Expect these will be shorter sessions perhaps more cursory in nature (less detail than would be covered in a week of content). \$99 USD for a day, \$199 USD for two days.

At the end of the session, many wanted to participate in more chats over the summer, as well as hold some case

study events, where individual members would overview their challenges. More to come. robw.whitlock@gmail.com



CERTIFICATE OF RECOGNITION

Chris Hay with his 2019 Certificate of Recognition and a photo of the Stanley Park Rock Garden. Hay has worked for years to have the Stanley Park Rock Garden recognized as a historic site in Vancouver, British Columbia, and nationally.

May 26, 2020 — When Chris Hay received a 2019 Certificate of Recognition from the British Columbia Historical Federation (BCHF) for

his invaluable efforts to have the Stanley Park Rock Garden recognized as a historic site in Vancouver, British Columbia, and nationally, he did not dream he would also receive a handwritten letter from **British Columbia Lieutenant Governor, Janet Austin**.

Dear Mr. Hay:

"I am writing to offer my heartfelt congratulations on receiving the BC Historical Federation's Award of Recognition for your outstanding commitment to restoring the Stanley Park Rock Garden. What a wonderful gift you have left for all British Columbians and our travelling visitors to enjoy and cherish.

"With best wishes and sincere appreciation, Janet"

The first public garden in Vancouver, the Stanley Park Rock Garden was laid out in 1911 by master gardener John Montgomery, and was one of Stanley Park's top attractions, but the park became neglected and gradually disappeared into the adjacent forest after the Second World War.

BCGS NEWS - CHRIS HAY - CERTIFICATE OF RECOGNITION, cont'd

Chris Hay, great-grandson of John Montgomery, rediscovered the rock garden when he began researching his family history. A devastating windstorm in 2006 revealed lost portions of the rock garden landscape.

After years of research and lobbying by Hay, the Stanley Park Rock Garden was recognized as one of Vancouver's "Places that Matter", added to the Vancouver City Heritage Register, and listed on the Canadian Register of Historic Places.

The BC Historical Federation's Award of Recognition is awarded to individuals who have given exceptional service to their organization or community, either for a specific project or for long service in the preservation of British Columbia's history.

Sadly, due to the ongoing COVID-19 health situation, the BCHF annual conference schedule for June 2020, including the awards gala, has been cancelled. Thus, the prizes are being announced early and plans are in the works for ways to honour winners during the BCHF conference in 2021; details to be announced.

The British Columbia Historical Federation (BCHF) encourages interest in the history of British Columbia through research, presentation, and support in its role as an umbrella organization for provincial historical societies. Established in 1922, the Federation currently provides a collective voice for over 100 member societies and 24,000 individuals in the provincial not-for-profit historical sector.

CRESCENT HOTEL, CRESCENT BEACH, BC - 1912

Captain Watkin Williams and his wife Elizabeth built the Crescent Hotel in 1912, on sea front property that they traded for a portion of their farm acreage. With no central heating, no insulation, and no electricity the hotel was only open from Victoria Day until Labour Day. Each room had a washstand, basin, and a jug of cold water - two indoor flush toilets and one bathtub were used communally. Each floor had a balcony and stairway to provide easy access to the beach and outdoor lavatories.

Because roads were so unreliable, the easiest way to get supplies in and out of the community was by rail or water. Until it was destroyed during a 1922 winter storm, the Crescent Hotel's pier was a vital supply link.

Crescent Hotel burned to the ground in January 1949. The lot remained empty until the City of Surrey built Beecher Place Community Centre on the site.

Museum of Surrey - Discover Your Story is an exhibit focusing on family history and discovery, available online from home. Featuring stories discovered by family researchers, this all-ages exhibit explores the resources available to Surrey families so they can build their own family trees.

While the museum is temporarily closed, displays and interactive elements will be shared via Facebook and Instagram for museum-goers to experience from home.

The exhibit is a collaboration between the Surrey Family History Centre, the BC Genealogical Society and Surrey Libraries - Family History.



As I Recollect - What's in a Name?

Have you ever wondered what's in a name? Why your grandfather named your mother Martha? What uncle Buck did to earn that nickname?

Why you always thought your gg-grandmother was named Marie when she was Irish? I have, and I think it gives subtle clues about family relationships.

My father, Allan Francis Keily, was known only as Duke. He was a pretty tough customer, having boxed in the ring to pick up a few dollars during the depression. With a reputation like that, he was often challenged to a fight at dances, in taverns, or simply walking on the street. Ma said he never looked for a fight but never backed down, either. Duke was a very fitting nickname, except fighting wasn't where it came from. Pa had a brother born in 1914 who died a year later. When Pa was born in 1916, my grandmother, still mourning the loss of Myron, was extremely protective of my dad. His older brothers and sister gave him the name Duke because he was being treated like royalty. I would never have guessed.

Grandpa Jack Keily must not have liked his father, Simon. Jack left Valcartier, Quebec at age 16 and never looked back. I surmised his dislike because of the names he gave his children. He named the firstborn, a daughter, after his mother, Catherine. He then named

his first son after his maternal grandfather, Edward Cassin. His next was named after his wife's brother, then Myron for no apparent reason as well as Allan.

Here is more verification of his dislike of his father - when my aunt was 17, she wrote a letter to her grandfather in Valcartier. Grandpa Jack picked up the mail, saw an

envelope from Quebec, destroyed the letter and told her to never write to his family again. It sure makes me wonder what that was about.

After years of searching, I was finally able to find another descendant of Simon and Kate Keily. Her name was Sharon Kiely Sawyer, a granddaughter of Joseph "Emmett" Kiely, grandpa's brother. Emmett and Grandpa Jack went different ways in 1893 and never communicated again. This is where it gets a bit eerie—Emmett had a granddaughter named Sharon. Jack had a granddaughter named Sharon. Emmett named Sharon's father Kenneth. I have a brother Kenneth. Sharon has a brother Patrick. I'm a Patrick. To top it off, Sharon Sawyer has a brother Allan, same spelling as my father's name. I can find no records of any of these names In our family tree, with the exception of Patrick, nor any neighbors of grandpa and Emmett by these names. Is this just a strange coincidence? I certainly could use help finding an explanation.

Finally, I mentioned in the opening about an Irish girl named Marie. Marie Colman, my gg-grandmother, was married to Edmond Keily. They lived in County Cork, Ireland. I got the name from Simon's marriage record and never gave it a thought. One day, Linda Maitland and I were working on genealogy when I mentioned Marie. "Marie?" She asked. "Why would you think her name was Marie? She's Irish." "Because", I said


smugly, "I found it in the church records in Valcartier." Linda gave me that look of, "Have you always been this dumb?" and said, "The priest was French, of course he's going to write Marie. Her name was Mary!" "So what? It's just a name, I thought to myself. It's just a name. Doesn't mean anything. Nothing.

What have I been doing lately? Well, when I look back it's hard to pinpoint. Lately, the days seem to blend into each other punctuated here and there



with Zoom meetings, conferences and deadlines. Every once in a while, there is even a book delivered to my door, which promises a story to wile away the hours or information about interesting new ways of looking at shared heritage.

A subject which came to the fore soon after genetic genealogy was that of trauma being transmitted through generations. I find this fascinating and

eagerly await the opportunity to dive into *It Didn't Start* with You, one of those bookish deliveries.

Another genealogy-related thing I got involved in lately was through the Family Writing Studio. Here the emphasis is on using the techniques of creative non-fiction to make more readable ancestral stories. For my first attempt, I chose the Reverend Thomas Strange. He may have been born in the early 1700s but I have been able to find a lot written about his life.

The name of her new husband wasn't given in any of the accounts but the July 1808 Memoir of The Late Rev. Thomas Strange of Kilsby, Northamptonshire said that Thomas worked for his step-father and added, "During this period, he was often literally a shepherd, and in that humble employment acquired, by attentive observation, that knowledge of clouds and weather by which he was distinguished through life."

Being a shepherd tending his flock was rather an appropriate former occupation for a minister. More than that though, I was struck by Reverend Thomas'

knowledge of weather. Through my research into his descendants, I had chanced upon a learned paper that Charles P. Chambers, a 2x great grandchild of the reverend's had written for the Barrow Naturalists' Field Club about "Climate and the Weather." That an interesting was

Recent literature has been about trauma passed on through the generations. But what if positive things, like a predilection to be interested in weather, are passed on as well? Although, I suppose the trauma angle is an easier sell. The negative tends to catch our attention and it's even better if a solution is offered. Then it can be a self-help book. Wouldn't it be interesting to see more written about genetics and positive traits that can be passed on through the generations to get a more balanced view? I hope that someone takes that on as we find out more about the wonderful world of genetic DNA.
