

There will be an "Online Resources" section, which will have a strong focus on BCGS members.





The Story Behind a Picture Postcard - May 2020 - MOTHER'S DAY Janice Kidwell, BCGS member #5033

Celebrations of mothers and motherhood can be traced back to the ancient Greeks and Romans, who held festivals in honour of the mother goddesses, Rhea and Cybele, although the clearest modern precedent for Mother's Day is the early Christian festival known as "Mothering Sunday."

Mother's Day is an occasion which is celebrated in various parts of the world to express respect, honour and love towards mothers, motherhood, maternal bonds and the contribution and influence of mothers in our society. It is celebrated on various days in many parts of the world, most commonly in the months of March or May.

The Indigenous mother is wearing a Chilkat blanket and a spruce root Haida hat. The child's hand is resting on a raven helmet with abalone and brass inlays. The background is a Haida whale design. The postcard is a Jalaine card, litho in Canada by Frank T. Coan Ltd., Vancouver, B.C. There is no message on the back.

This postcard of a mother swan and her three cygnets was most likely taken in Switzerland as the original owner of the card has written "Luzerne May 1990" on the top back and the wording Photoglob Zurich/Vevey appears at the bottom. There is no message on the back.





Find A Grave is one of many cemetery-related websites. BCGS has a project team that is adding entries from our own BCGS cemetery publications to Find A Grave. (The BCGS Genealogical Library has print and digital copies of these BCGS publications.) Many headstones were recorded in the 1970s and may or may not now be readable so this project of adding our headstone transcriptions

If you want to be able to add your own entries to Find A Grave, creating an ID (identifier) only takes a few minutes and the ID is free. If you are just searching Find A Grave, an ID is not necessary. https://www.findagrave.com/

GENEALOGY GEMS - WEBINARS DURING THE COVID-19 LOCKDOWN

Celia Lewis, Member #5183, BCGS Webinar Coordinator WEBINARS - free genealogy experts in your living room

You've heard the term 'webinars' [online seminars] and maybe you'd like to watch one. BUT you're not certain how much it might cost, how to get one

to your computer, will it bring viruses in to damage your computer, maybe it will be tedious, or the speaker will talk too fast or...

I'm completely addicted to Webinars by now, having been watching them for over 12 years! And as a retiree living on no pension with no assets, I pinch every loonie in order to indulge my genealogy addiction - er, hobby! Now is an excellent time to explore online genealogy webinars that you can watch any time of the day or night. Here are a few ideas for you to get started.

Cost: I particularly like FREE - and there are many free webinars

Access: Very easy on some sites. In others, you will be asked to download an app - always say "yes."

Viruses? No problem. Several common apps such as GoToWebinar are used with no problems at all. You're significantly more likely to be downloading viruses with those "cute/funny" attachments your friends send to you in group emails.

Speakers: Top notch genealogists/historians/lecturers are chosen to present a topic, and almost always there is a helpful handout they've written for you to download to your computer. Again, no fear of viruses with them.

- So **WHERE** do you find a webinar topic you'd like to explore or learn about-?
- Cyndi's List of course! Start on her site, do a search, first on *Education*, then on the subtopic of *Online Courses* Webinars. Always a great place to start looking. https://www.cyndislist.com/
- 2. **GENEAWEBINARS** The most useful place to find a webinar/online education on any topic. The calendar is kept up to date, and the links help you as well. Times of webinars are shown in Mountain Time. You can easily print out the list for each week or month.

3. **FamilySearch** - Their education webinars are meant to be ongoing education for the volunteers in their Family History Libraries around the world, but also are available to everybody. It takes a bit of clicking, but go to their WIKI under Search, then in the small search box on the top right, type in Webinars, then click on the next page for FamilySearch Webinars. *[every space below is an _ underline]*

- 4. **LEGACY Family Tree Webinars \$\$** from the company who developed/sell my favourite family tree software. There are about 1200 webinars currently in the library, at least 9 new ones/month, plus free bonus ones for members. Some are always FREE, and are labelled. The regularly scheduled ones are free from the day they're online and for 6 days afterwards. However, handouts are only available for active members. Subscribe for a month or a year. Highly recommended, covering many topics. Pick a specific topic: say, England, and see 3 upcoming webinars, 24 already presented. Upcoming Seminars: https://familytreewebinars.com/upcoming-webinars.php You do NOT have to be a member to register for any webinar.
- 5. **Genealogical Societies**: e.g., Southern California GS, Florida GS, Illinois GS, New York G&BS, Ontario GS, and more. Many societies are presenting one or two webinars a month, free at the time they are presented. Handouts are only available to active members. Memberships range from \$40-75 per year.

This should give you a great start on watching a webinar or more while we're still on self-isolation and before we start showing webinars at our Library, or put our meetings online!







INDEXERS NEEDED

She has recently started to digitise these clippings and match them to the index that has already been done. Bob Buchanan has digitised at least seven years of the Vancouver Sun and now an index is needed.

In mid-April, we used Facebook to ask for help and about 15 people came forward. It was interesting that not all people were members of BCGS. They came from all over. To-date we have already indexed almost 100 pages of The Vancouver Sun 2002. The index is done on Google Sheets or on Excel spreadsheets. It looks like this:



The Canadian National Railway began construction of what would become the third Hotel Vancouver in 1928. The Great Depression halted the project until 1937 when, as a public works project that was aimed to pull the city out of its financial doldrums, construction was restarted.

King George VI and Queen Elizabeth were the hotel's inaugural guests after they officially opened the third Hotel Vancouver on May 25 1939.

Canada's "King of Swing" Dal Richards was only 22 when his big band orchestra played the Hotel Vancouver's "Panorama Roof" for the first time on April 26, 1940. His gig famously lasted for 25 years.







Last Vignettes on the Farm Years

NOTE from Judith Ueland: Charles

Brumwell is my granddaughter's great-uncle and is known to us as "Uncle Charles". He grew up on a farm in Alberta, which was situated seven miles NE of Vauxhall across the Bow River from Brooks and about 40-50 miles from Lethbridge. This is one of the stories he has written about life on the farm during our "self-isolating" time due to Covid 19.

From the time of my birth until I started school in grade one, I was called "Junior" named after my dad, Alexander - as in Alex junior. Junior was what I answered to and I guess I thought it was my proper name, not just a family one. When my mother took me to register in grade one and she was asked for my full name, she replied his name is Alexander Charles. Apparently, I erupted into a melt-down, demanding to have my "own" name. So Charles Alexander made his appearance. My brothers called me "Chuck" and their kids do so to this day - "Uncle Chuck". Later in school, I became Charlie.



In the 1930s, my dad was a keen supporter of the Calgary Stampede, which was an Alberta yearly celebration attended by people far and

wide. As kids, we looked forward to all the events and especially the Cowboys and Indians. Groups of bulls and horses were herded to the site from various farms and ranches as participants. It was a fairly rowdy event.

I think we went to the last one before the war in 1939 or 1940. I don't think it was held during the war.

I remember there was a windshield sticker advertising the Stampede on the last trip. Churchill had just made his famous speech in forecasting the dark days to come. He concluded, "We are sure at the end all will be well". Large numbers of windshield stickers were issued with this slogan to try and allay public anxiety. My dad put this sticker under the stampede one as a joke intimating that Churchill was referring to the rowdy stampede.

There was a Royal Visit by the King and Queen to Canada just before the war, I suppose to promote patriotism to prepare for the coming conflict. We were



all bundled up and taken to Calgary to view them as they stopped on the train doing their cross country The journey. platform station was packed as the train rolled slowly by with the King standing alone on the back deck of the last car in view and holding what

looked like a movie camera. Just as he was approaching us waving our little Union Jack flags, he suddenly wheeled around and disappeared into the car. So we just saw where he had been standing. Hail Britannia!

Restricted to Armchair Travel


Lately there are some days that I feel like I am glued to my computer. It is my window to the world and I can't imagine life without an internet


things off by taking an around the world cruise in 1955.

From what I can tell, their itinerary was similar in part to the one in "The Grand Tour: Around the World with the Queen of Mystery" based on Agatha Christie's letters while on tour in the 1920s which I can use as a source. Not too much would have changed in the world of cruising between those two eras.

Even better, I have my grandfather's travel diary (right) with its cryptic notes and photos tucked between its pages. Yes, there is writing on the back of the photos, such as it is. So, I have clues to find out more about their journey. But it is their time in Australia which interests me most. While



there, my grandfather met up with family and sent a letter to his daughter with a rudimentary family tree (see photo below). Between that information and the few photos that feature family, I now have more family history to uncover. Abraham Martin dit l'Écossais

We would like to introduce **Abraham Martin** who has direct links to

several members of our Quebec Questers BCGS interest group:

8x great-grandfather to Kathleen Gratton Graham 9x great-grandfather to Marianne Côté-Malley 10x great-grandfather to Jim Graham 11x great-grandfather to Linda Maitland

Abraham Martin was born about 1589 and buried on September 8, 1664 at Notre-Dame Basilique, Quebec City. He was commonly called "the Scot" or, as they say in French "l'Écossais". There are many theories about this "dit" name or nickname. We do not know if he was born in Scotland, which would explain the nickname, or possibly France. Some suggest he sailed to Scotland several times and knew Scots. Others posit that he or his father left Scotland in the Gaelic force for the King of France. One individual suggests that his father was loyal



to Mary Queen of Scots. There are almost as many suggestions as there are investigators!

We do know that Abraham Martin and his wife Marguerite Langlois immigrated to New France between 1619 and 1621 and they were one of the first three families in New

France to receive land grants. They definitely arrived before the baptism of their son Eustache on October 24, 1621 in Québec City. According to church records,

Eustache was the first child of immigrants to be baptized in New France.

Abraham has been called Canada's first pilot. The family was inextricably woven into early Canadian history. Samuel de Champlain was a godfather to their daughter Hélène. She later married the explorer Médard Court Desgroseilliers who, alongside his brother-in-law Pierre-Esprit Radisson, convinced the English King Charles II to grant the 1670 charter for the Hudson's Bay Company.

Ironically, Abraham's most known contribution occurred 105 years after his death. Wilson (2013) wrote, "The land had belonged to Abraham Martin, a navigator known as the king's pilot who knew the river waters well for he had frequently fished there and in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. In 1635, in return for his services, Martin had been granted 12 acres on the outskirts of Quebec and ten years later received an additional 20 acres as a gift. In 1667, Abraham sold the land to the Ursulines religious order. Chance had chosen this rustic spot, this peaceful patch of a farmer's field, which became...a giant stage on which the fortunes of war would decide the fate of two nations." That land is known to this day as The Plains of Abraham! The battle on those fields was a seminal moment for the fate of New France and the future of Canada.
