CAMP McKINNEY, B.C. CAMP McKINNEY CEMETERY

This cemetery was recorded October 17, 1978 by way of a colour photograph taken of the last remaining tombstone in 1977, by Mrs. Grace Hawkes. Photo is in the Kettle Valley Museum.

Camp McKinney was a major town in the 1880's. It was brought into being by the presence of gold in that area. As the gold dwindled so did the town. Today there are just a few ruined buildings remaining. The town can be reached by taking the No. 3 Highway east from Osoyoos. Turn left onto the Mount Baldy Ski Area access road which is about 35 km. east of Osoyoos and intersects the No. 3 Highway at the Canyon View Cafe. This road is well marked at the highway but it is not paved and a four-wheel drive vehicle is recommended during the winter and spring. Continue on the Mt. Baldy Ski Area access road for about 10 km. Camp McKinney is on the left at this point.

Do not attempt to drive into this area from Oliver as apparently a bridge is out over one of the creeks. It is recommended that one obtains a copy of OKANAGAN BACK ROADS:

VOL. 1: SOUTH CENTRAL OKANAGAN, by Dave Stewart before attempting to drive to Camp McKinney. The cemetery in on a hill above the townsite.
